

- Mother "Armenian" Christian


BELFAST'S CONTRIBUTION



RMS CEDRIC

- Built Harland and Wolff shipyard, Belfast
- Launched 1903
- 21,000 tons
- 1912 'Abdu'l-Bahá crosses Atlantic (Alexandria-Naples-New York)
- He later returns on Cedric's sister ship, RMS Celtic

THE FIRST IRISH BAHÁ'Í



- Frederick D'Evelyn
- Born Belfast 1855
- Emigrated to USA
- 1901 Bahá'í
- Active and distinguished member of early Bahá'í community
- Died 1932

LADY BLOMFIELD



- Born Co. Tipperary
- Religious mixed marriage
- Humble early life
- Marriage to Sir Arthur Blomfield
- 1907 Bahá'í
- Host to 'Abdu'l-Bahá in London
- Service and writing
- Philanthropic work
- Died 1939

LADY BLOMFIELD





COYNE AND CULVERS

- Peter Coyne
 - Becomes Bahá'í in Missouri USA
 1907
- Culver family, already Bahá'ís
 - Henry Culver US Consul Queenstown (now Cobn) 1906-10


FIRST NATIVE BELIEVERS?

 - -Waringstown, Lurgan
- Thomas Roderick Fforde
 1882 1949
 - -Raughlan, Co. Armagh
- Marriage


FIRST NATIVE BELIEVERS?

- Ahmad Sohrab's diary entry ("Star of the West") speaks of Joan
- Document 1913 donation receipt
- First to have public identity as Bahá'ís in Ireland
- JE Esslemont and George Townshend both write of them
- Settle in Donegal

- "...this remarkable book." (Scottish Sunday Herald)




- Churchman

- "Luminary"
- Inspiration

- "A vigorous, prolific, adventurous, talented and highly diversified set"
 - David Hofman on the Townshend family of Castletownshend, County Cork
- Father, Charles Townshend, employed "a promising youngster"
 - George Bernard Shaw

- Born Dublin 14.vi.1876
- Education
 - "...Hertford College, Oxford, from which he graduated with a modest B.A. and a good collection of trophies for his athletic prowess." (David Hofman)
- Dublin, law, called to the bar

- USA, ordained Episcopal Church
- 1916
 - Return to Ireland
 - Encounter with the Bahá'í Faith
- 1918 Writes to 'Abdu'l-Bahá
- Becomes a Bahá'í, believes passionately in reconciliation of Christian and Bahá'í beliefs



- 1932 Canon, St.
 Patrick's
 Cathedral, Dublin
- 1933 Archdeacon of Clonfert "Very Rev. George Townshend"

- 1930s Begins to write books on the Bahá'í Faith and its teachings
- 1947 Formally resigns from Church
- 1951 Appointed Hand of the Cause
- "Christ and Bahá'u'lláh" 1957
- Passes away 25.iii.1957
